Inspired by the Northern Lights Festival in Antwerp, Belgium, which served as a platform for community engagement and cultural exchange, the "Materials Managed Parade" was a vibrant celebration of recycling. The parade was a dynamic response to the growing need for environmental sustainability, aiming to elevate awareness about recycling and showcase the transformative power of reclaimed materials. The parade took place in Johannesburg's lively neighbourhoods of Brixton and Auckland Park, bringing together the community to celebrate the achievements of recycling. It highlighted the critical role played by the African Reclaimers Organisation (ARO) and the artistry of informal reclaimers who convert discarded materials into valuable resources.

The event featured captivating performances, engaging displays, and eco-friendly trolleys, all designed to promote the impact of recycling and the essential work of reclaimers in our communities.

The event's success is attributed to the meticulous planning and organisation by Wilma Mutize, who orchestrated the parade with remarkable dedication. According to Gordon Froud, Head of the Department of Visual Art at the University of Johannesburg, "Wilma really outdid herself in organising the ARO Reclaimers' Parade in Brixton on Sat 24 August 2024. Her efforts in coordinating with various stakeholders and ensuring the smooth execution of the event were exceptional. The parade was a joyous occasion that united the Brixton community with a common purpose and strengthened our relationship with the University of Johannesburg."
