WEBINAR PRESENTED BY DR BABERE KERATA CHACHA





Dr Babere Kerata Chacha is a Senior Lecturer in African History at the Department of Social Studies of Laikipia University in Kenya. He is the founder and coordinator of the Centre for Human Rights at Laikipia University. Dr Chacha has been a fellow at the University of London (School of Oriental and African Studies), the University of Oxford (St. Antony's College), the University of Cambridge (Wolfson College) and the New South Wales University in Australia, and – in recognition of his feminist work - he was awarded a Sarah Bartmann inaugural fellowship in the San and Khoi Centre at the University of Cape Town in 2021. He has previously taught History and Development Studies at the University of Eastern Africa, Baraton and at Egerton University in Kenya. In addition, Dr Chacha acted as a key consultant for Truth, Justice and Reconciliation Commission in Kenya on political assassinations. His research focuses on Human Rights, gender, education, reconciliation, religion, and sexuality.

Repositioning African Women's History in the University Curriculum: Gain and Gaps

While great achievements have been made in Women and Gender Studies on the continent, there is very little evidence of centering African Women's History into the curriculum of higher education on the continent. As such, this presentation explores the critical need to do so, to underscore the transformative potential of incorporating diverse perspectives, shedding light on the resilience, agency, and contributions of African women throughout the continent's history. By challenging Eurocentric narratives and amplifying the voices of African women, the presentation advocates for a more inclusive and comprehensive approach to higher education on the continent with a need for a deeper understanding of gender dynamics, social justice, and human rights in Africa and beyond.
